Welcome!

The International Social Work and Society Academy (TiSSA) is excited to welcome you at the 22nd TiSSA conference in Warsaw, Poland. The PhD-Pre conference will be held from Friday 28.08.2026 until Sunday 30.08.2026 in conjunction with the Plenum conference from Monday 31.08.2026 until Wednesday 02.09.2026. During the conference, we discuss current developments and challenges in social work research and practice.

About

The international Social Work & Society Academy (TiSSA) is an independent cooperation between European universities, institutes and organisations. It was built up in 2002 as result of an European TEMPUS- TACIS-Project by the initiative of Prof. dr. Hans-Uwe Otto (Bielefeld University, Germany), dr. Olga Borodkina (St. Petersburg State University, Russia), Prof. dr. Walter Lorenz (Free University of Bolzano, Italy) and Prof. dr. John Harris (University of Warwick, Great Britain) to enhance and promote the international scientific and professional discourse about social work and its relation to society, especially against the background of fundamental transformations of 'the social' in the context of globalization. TiSSA provides a forum for involving professionals and academics in innovative discussion on theory and practice at the cutting edge of the social professions. Its overall aim is to identify how the needs of a wide range of societies experiencing transition can be met through the generation of new knowledge, concepts and models. The organisers of TiSSA assume, that socio-economical developments indicate categorically that social work has to deal with its relation to the respective societies in a critical way, in order to build out a clear professional profile for the future, for a renewal of perspectives and to improve its agency. Any site of economic, political and social transition poses a challenge to social professions to reflect on new approaches to social work. In doing so, TiSSA focuses on promoting a comparative approach to the analysis of social work and society, enhancing the development of knowledge, skills and experience, shaping organisational changes and new governance processes, analysing quality criteria and reflecting on best practice and encouraging the international dissemination and exchange of information on significant developments.

Conference theme

Social work and social pedagogy: research, impact and social change.

In contemporary social work and social pedagogical research, we are increasingly required to demonstrate impact: to show – often through evidence-based numerical indicators – that our studies generate measurable outcomes. Yet the deeper mission of social work and social pedagogical researchers is to critically analyse the structures that reproduce inequality, to bring forward voices that remain silenced in dominant accounts, and to develop theoretical and empirical insights that sustain forms of solidarity capable of challenging the status quo. As researchers, this role as ‘agents of change’ risks becoming constrained when impact is defined primarily in managerial or technocratic terms. What is needed is space for a more activist, critical, and imaginative research practice. Research should not only describe social realities; it should also question and unsettle them. It should open new political and conceptual possibilities instead of merely confirming institutional expectations.

This conference invites us to reclaim our role as public intellectuals: as scholars who contribute to public debate, interrogate dominant narratives, and co-produce quantitative and qualitative knowledge in dialogue with communities and with each other. In doing so, we strengthen the transformative potential of social work and social pedagogical research; aligning impact with justice, and linking social change to collective empowerment rather than to compliance.

Host city

Warsaw, the vibrant capital of Poland, combines historical charm with modern energy. The city rose from the ashes of war and today radiates innovation, creativity, and vitality. Stroll through the beautifully reconstructed Old Town, discover contemporary architecture along the Vistula River, and enjoy a thriving cultural scene filled with music, art, and gastronomy. Maria Grzegorzewska University (APS) in Warsaw is one of Poland's leading institutions in social sciences and education, founded over 100 years ago. It specializes in pedagogy, psychology, and sociology, offering Bachelor's, Master's, and Doctoral programs. Social work in the Faculty of Applied Social Sciences is conducted within the frameworks of two specialisations: Social Work in Social Care and Social Work for Family Support.

APS is renowned for its research in special and social education and hosts the UNESCO Janusz Korczak Chair in Social Pedagogy. The university actively participates in Erasmus+ with 49 partner universities and provides rich academic resources, fostering innovation and inclusion in education and social development. The founder of the university Prof Maria Grzegorzewska (1888-1967) was the pioneer of social inclusion and special education in Poland. Children rights activist Dr Janusz Korczak (1878-1942) worked at Maria Grzegorzewska University. In 2004, the 'UNESCO / Janusz Korczak Chair in Social Pedagogy' was established at the Maria Grzegorzewska University, preserving the educational heritage of both Maria Grzegorzewska and Janusz Korczak.
